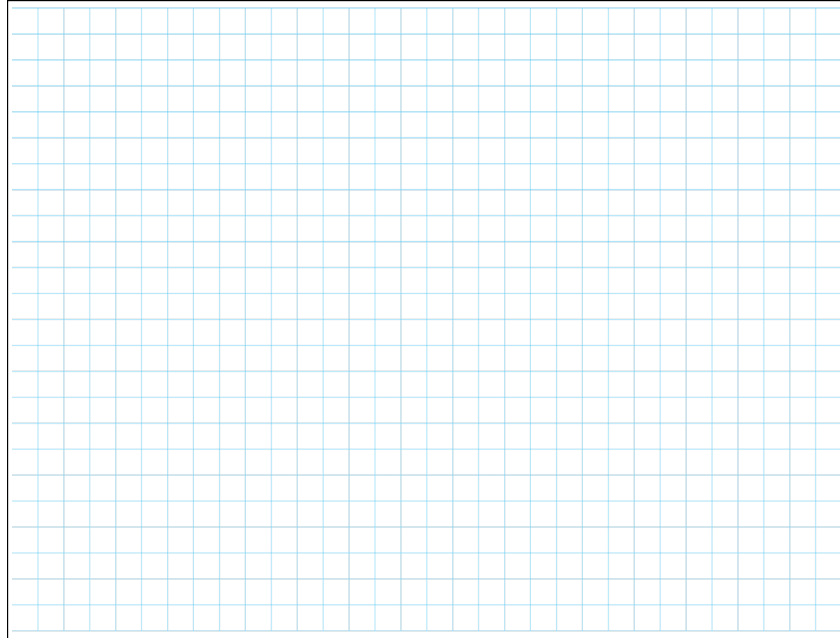

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Steps for Offset Crosses

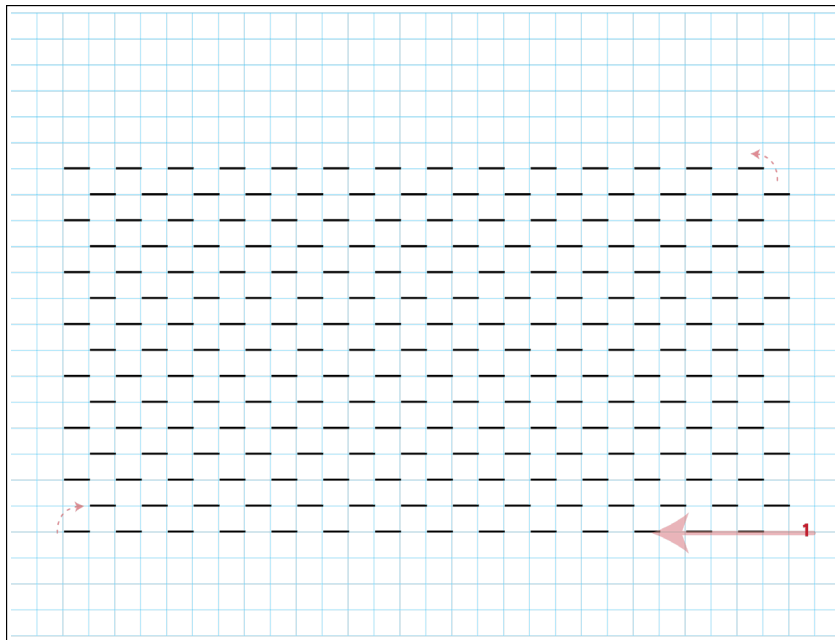
Step 1: Draw a Basic 1:1 Grid

We recommend 1/4" (5mm)



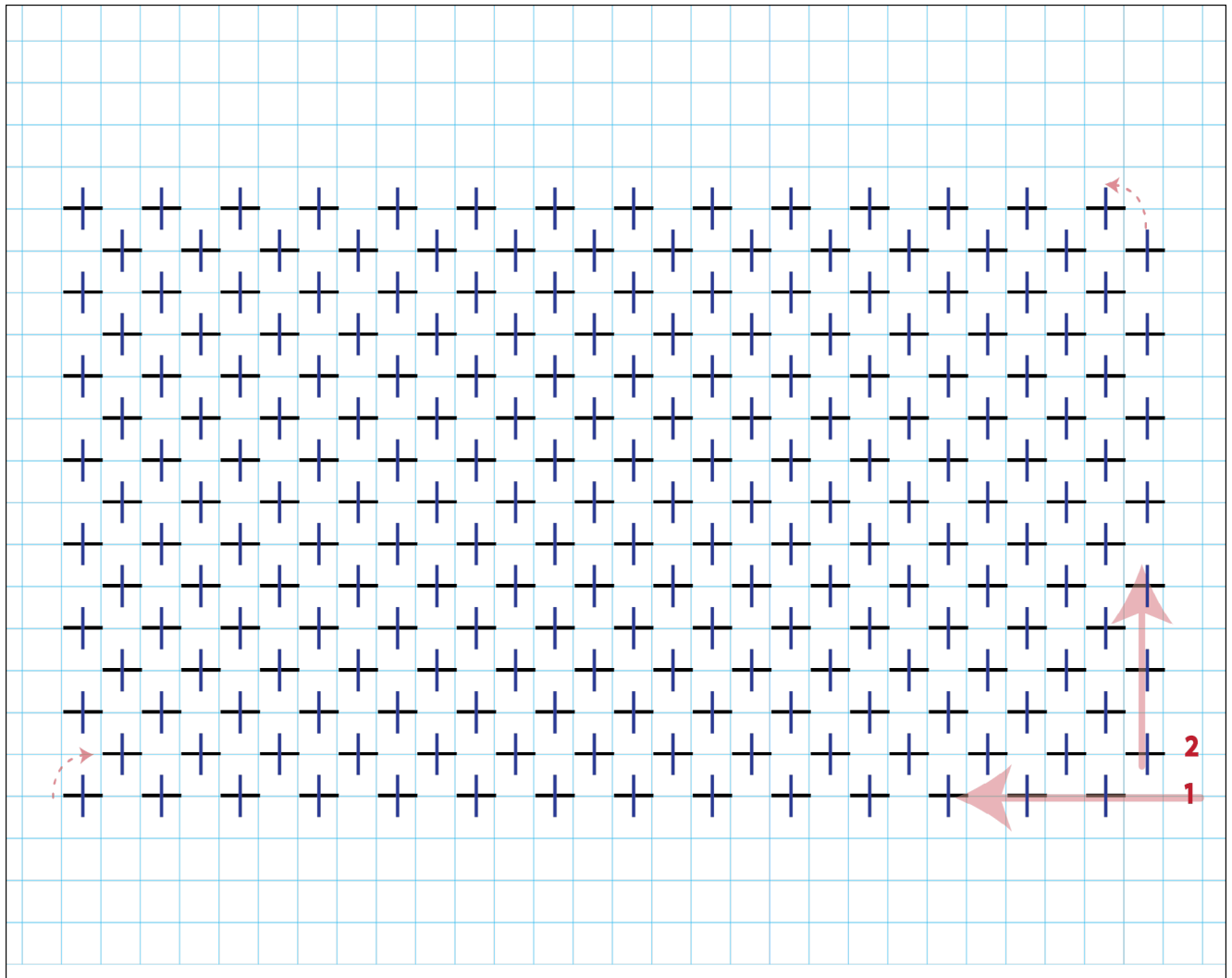
Step 2: Offset Running Stitch

One stitch in each grid space



Step 3: Finish Offset Crosses

Turn your work and cross all stitches



When you first attempt crossing, your stitches will be large... This is normal! As you practice you will with ease be able to make smaller and cleaner crosses.

There are many variations of Hitomezashi sashiko using Offset Crosses as a base. By adding diagonal lines, changing where you place them and how many you use, you can create a multitude of unique patterns. Check out our books, ***Stitching Sashiko***, and ***Boro and Sashiko: Harmonious Imperfection*** for diagrams of many of these patterns!
